In the header, leave 5 spaces between the shortened title and the page number.

Include your name, class, instructor, and date.

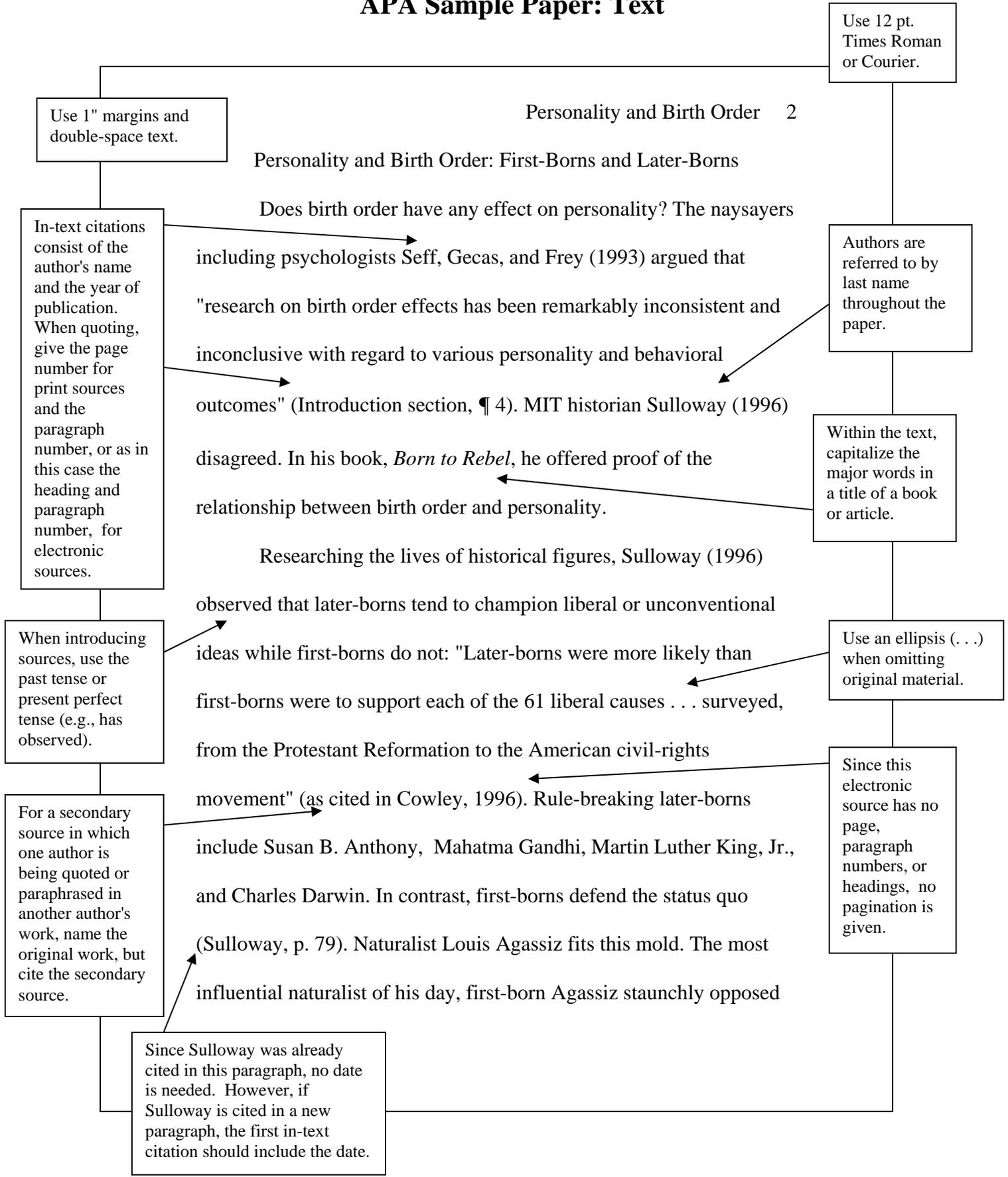

Darwin's radical notions about biological change:

A quotation of 40 words or more starts on a new line and is indented 1/2" or 5 spaces.

Quoted material within a block quotation are enclosed with double quotation marks.

When Darwin proposed a revolutionary solution--that all nature's variety stems from a simple process that preserves useful variations and discards harmful ones--the authorities were appalled. "A scientific mistake" thundered Louis Agassiz, . . . "untrue in its facts . . . and mischievous in its tendency."  
(Cowley)

In a block quotation, end punctuation comes before the in-text citation.

References

Sources are listed in alphabetical order by author's last name. If there is no author, move the publication date after the title and alphabetize by the first major word in the title.

The second line of each entry is indented 1/2" or 5 spaces.

In the reference list, capitalize only the first word in the title and subtitle of a book or article.

Title page is the first thing readers will notice before they even start reading your work. So it becomes really important that you format your title page using the correct APA style. Instructions on the Correct Way for APA Paper Format. Any minor mistake gives a bad impression about the quality of your work. Presently all colleges and universities prefer the title page to be designed in APA style. Oftentimes, students find it difficult to keep their formatting in the correct APA format—following are a few instructions will make the process easy: At the top left of the title page, you need to APA research paper formatting guidelines: title page, abstract, body, citations, and references. Learn on fonts, margins, spacing in APA formating. The reference guide Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association contains recommendations on how to format papers, how to cite sources, and how research should be structured. The text should be typed on standard 8.5" x 11" white paper. The APA style requires using an easy-to-read font, recommending size 12, Times New Roman font. Double spacing is required on both the title page and throughout the p... An APA title page is a reader's first impression of a paper. There are two format types: professional and student. Learn how to create both with this guide. For students, the title page also lets people know which class, professor, and institution the text was written for. For professional authors, the title page is an opportunity to share any affiliations or conflicts of interest that might be present. APA Style recognizes two different ways to format a title page.
