Keisuke Nakashima's 6 research works with 252 citations and 285 reads, including: Is there intracellular cellulose in the appendicularian tail epidermis? A tale of the adult tail of an invertebrate chordate. Scanning electron microscopy (SEM) is a powerful way to obtain high-resolution stereoscopic images (de Souza et al. 2008). In appendicularians, however, only a few studies have conducted SEM observations (Flood 1975; Fredriksson and Olsson 1991; Bassham and Poslethwait 2005; Nakashima et al.
